REAL LIVES

The most basic need brought Marilyn to Spokane Valley Partners - Food. Since that first visit she has found so much more just food. She found amazing volunteers who are ready to selflessly serve her family through food, clothing, diapers, coats, and holiday help. As a working household with two incomes Marilyn finds her family just above federal assistance eligibility - joining a large percentage of working poor Spokane Valley Partners clients. When resources are scarce and there's not enough to eat Marilyn finds herself just eating what is left on her children's plates.

Hunger and poverty are complicated. Marilyn's family has experienced a substantial rental increase and care for two children with medical needs. Making an impact in the lives of mothers like Marilyn and her family is the reason Spokane Valley Partners was founded.

MISSION IN ACTION

FOOD BANK

Spokane Valley Partners Food Bank provides over 700 tons of groceries each year to over 10,000 families and neighbors in need. Through food rescue, individual donations, and partnerships with Second Harvest and Northwest Harvest we are able to meet the needs of the community we serve.

INLAND NORTHWEST DIAPER BANK

One out of 3 families struggle to buy diapers for their children. The Inland Northwest Diaper Bank is here to assist community agencies serving those families through Eastern Washington. Agencies throughout the region receive 10,000 diapers monthly to support their missions.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

In Spokane County 1 in 5 children live in households that don't have enough food for every family member to lead a healthy life. This food insecurity threatens a child's well-being and potential for success. Food For Thought provides weekend meals for nearly 500 students each week to help improve school performance, academic success and cognitive development.

CLOTHING BANK

As the region's largest clothing bank Spokane Valley Partners provides over 50,000 pounds of clothing to over 5,000 families. Essential household needs such as cleaning supplies, hygiene products, diapers and other small household items are also accepted and distributed to those in need.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE

Spokane Valley Partners provides emergency utility assistance for people with no place left to turn. In partnership with Avista, Modern Electric and Vera Spokane Valley Partners is able to provide financial assistance for utilities to residents in the Spokane Valley. Additional assistance is also provided to seniors with needs including prescriptions and medical equipment.

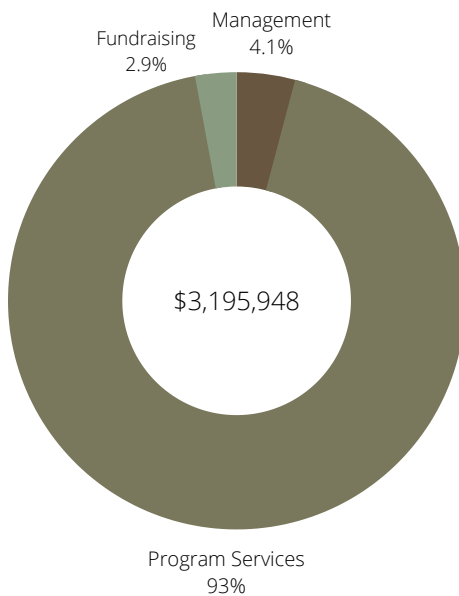
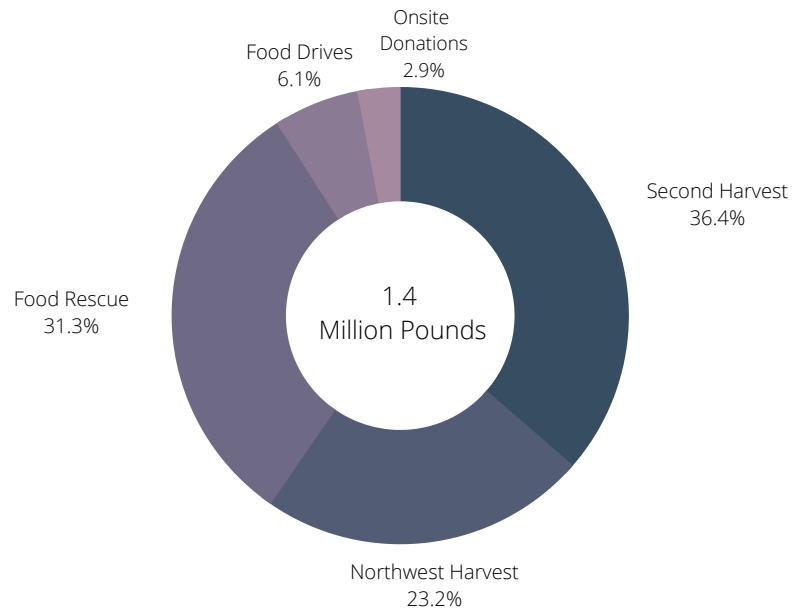
PROTECTIVE PAYEE SERVICES

Our Protective Payee program assists those not fully capable of managing their own Social Security or DSHS benefits. Our financial counselor works with clients to ensure security in housing, food, and medical needs. Through financial management, and protection from financial abuse and victimization clients achieve greater financial stability and independence.

STEWARDING YOUR SUPPORT

Of the \$3,343,929 in revenue, 17.6% was generated through cash donations and events and 2.5% through grants. An astonishing 77.9% was generated through in-kind sources. This reflects our incredible community partnerships that allow us to execute our critical mission. While the majority of those in-kind donations support our food bank, 83,500 pounds of clothing as well as diapers were donated to support our other service lines.
